#### WHAT WE DO

The Oxfordshire Buildings Record (OBR) works to:

- encourage the recording of buildings
- promote research
- advance education

We are interested in a wide range of buildings: vernacular and polite, traditional and modern; dwellings and workplaces, in towns and the countryside.

### RECORDING

Careful recording is key to understanding buildings, and this is our main activity. We are interested in:

- local and regional surveys
- buildings types of all sorts
- building materials
- building techniques, including carpentry and masonry
- documentary evidence.

On a recording project the team will aim to cater for all levels of skill and different member interests. The results include photographs, sketches, written descriptions and measured drawings. The OBR has its own surveying equipment, thanks to an Awards for All grant. We are always interested to hear of any building that may be worth recording.

# **RESEARCH**

We use documentary evidence to research the history of buildings. Members who prefer to work in libraries and record offices are equally welcome. Sources used can be as diverse as old maps, census returns, trade directories, deeds of sale, inventories, sale brochures and planning applications.

## **TRAINING**

We encourage experienced members to work with beginners on recording days, some of which are specifically aimed at new members. These are based in an historic building and adopt a 'hands-on' approach.

#### **ARCHIVE**

OBR building reports are available to members via our website, and we are working to make copies for study at the Oxfordshire History Centre.

## **VISITS AND EVENTS**

Members share results of recording work and ideas at the annual Presentation Day, when we also explore the local area with a knowledgeable guide. This – like our AGM, which follows a similar format – is held at a different place each year. We also have an annual joint lecture with the Oxfordshire Architectural and Historical Society on an architectural theme.

### **PROJECTS**

We try to give focus to our recording through specific projects. We have recently supported a major recording project in Chipping Norton funded by Historic England, which allowed tree-ring dating to be carried out on some of the buildings. We also work closely with the Victoria County History, and in Ewelme Hundred we recorded a number of key buildings and also carried out wider surveys for the linked South Oxfordshire Project. Earlier work for the Heritage Lottery funded England's Past for Everyone project resulted in the illustrated book, *Burford – Buildings and People in a Cotswold Town*.

### **NEWSLETTER**

The OBR publishes a quarterly electronic newsletter, *The Oxon Recorder*, which contains articles on buildings visited or recorded by members, reports of conferences, and other items of specialist interest such as book reviews. It also gives details of forthcoming events.

### **WEBSITE**
